**Definite and Indefinite Articles**

	Definite	Indefinite	Rule
Singular	the	a	Used in front of singular nouns that you can count (count nouns).
		an	Used instead of a, in front of count nouns that begin with a vowel or vowel sound.
Plural	the	-	Used with any noun, when both the speaker and listener have a specific thing or person in mind.

\* Indefinite articles don't have a plural form, and they are never used with plural nouns or with mass nouns.

**Prepositions**

Case	Example
from	Where are you <b>from</b> ? I'm <b>from</b> Costa Rica.
in	I'm <b>in</b> English 101. We live <b>in</b> Costa Rica.
on	They are <b>on</b> the same soccer team. I greet with a pat <b>on</b> the back.

**Pronouns / Possessives**

Subject Pronouns	Possessive Adjectives
I	My
You	Your
He	His
She	Her
It	Its
We	Our
They	Their

\* Subject Pronouns go before a verb or an auxiliary.

\* Possessive Adjectives go before a noun.

**Verb TO BE**

	Present	Negative
<b>I</b>	am ('m)	am not
<b>you</b>	are ('re)	aren't
<b>he</b>	is ('s)	isn't
<b>she</b>	is ('s)	isn't
<b>it</b>	is ('s)	isn't
<b>we</b>	are ('re)	aren't
<b>they</b>	are ('re)	aren't

<b>Affirmative Sentences</b>	Subject + verb be + object
<b>Negative Sentences</b>	Subject + (verb be + not) + object
<b>Yes/No Questions *</b>	Verb be + subject + object + ?
<b>Wh... Questions</b>	Wh... + verb be + subject + object + ?

Wh...: Who - What - When - Why - Where - Which - How

\*Answers for Yes/No questions:

<b>Affirmative Short Answer **</b>	Yes, + subject + verb be.
<b>Negative Short Answer</b>	No, + subject + (verb be + not).
<b>Affirmative Complete Answer</b>	Yes, + subject + verb be + object.
<b>Negative Complete Answer</b>	No, + subject + verb be + not + object.

\*\* Don't use contractions in affirmative short answers.
